### **Direct from the Director**

### **Duane Gilles**

As I am writing this article in the third week of November, we have just had our first cold snap of the fall season in southern Indiana. Today, I gave an interview to a local television station and the reporter wanted to know if the Evansville Water Utility was going to have as many water main breaks as last year. She asked me if we were prepared for winter and I responded that the Utility keeps a supply of repair clamps and couplings in stock. However, the number of water main breaks varies greatly in a water system with an aging infrastructure. During my interview, I also stated that each year brings different weather patterns and provides challenges to water operators of which the general public is not fully aware.



The winterization of your water system is important! As temperatures vary from 50+degrees to the low 20's within 24 hours, the water operator must reprioritize the small leak in the street as the water freezes, possibly creating a hazard for motorists. Garden hoses must be removed from outside faucets and irrigation systems deactivated, drained or blown out. Outdoor pumps for swimming pools and fountains must be winterized. Utility operators and contractors must make sure that ditch pumps, hydro-static pumps, pressure gauges and all devices that hold water are drained and stored properly. The water must be shut off to any vacant houses in the water system. Any temporary fire hydrant meters need to be removed and not used during freezing temperatures. Freezing water will not only ruin the water meter; it will also split the body of the fire hydrant. Utility vehicles must also be winterized. Many of these tasks are overlooked as the temperature falls so quickly and water turns into damaging, expanding ice. As you read this, we are past this winter startup period and will be in the middle of winter.

An American Water Works Association (AWWA) membership provides you with the resources, educational opportunities and lifelong relationships that will supply you with the knowledge to take back to your communities so you can improve the efficiency of your Utility. There are also AWWA standards that are provided upon request with your Utility's membership that will enable your Utility, engineering firm, material manufacturer, material supplier or contractor to keep up with state-of-the-art service to your customers. The AWWA Indiana Section membership consists of men and women who are dedicated to the health and welfare of the people of Indiana.

Please join me at the 108<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference to be held at the Downtown Marriott in Indianapolis on January 25-28. The theme this year is, "Water: Crucial to Indiana's Future."

The conference opens early the morning of Tuesday, January 26<sup>th</sup> with a formal ribbon cutting at the main entrance to the exhibit hall. The Manufacturers Associates Council provides an exhibit hall that will be educational and interesting. Then on to the Opening Session which kicks off more than two days of educational sessions. These sessions include a variety of topics that will include: distribution, financing, planning, treatment, small systems, water quality, regulations and much more. These educational sessions provide an opportunity to earn both Continuing Educations Units (CEUs) and Professional Development Hours (PDHs).

I am very pleased to announce that AWWA Vice-President Brenda Lennox will be our guest at the Annual Meeting! Brenda has worked for Tualatin Valley Water District in Oregon for 20 years and has been a member of the AWWA for 15 years.

### Silent Auction


### Cathy Lance & Carla Mann, Co-Chairs


### Thank You from Jim Williams...

Brenda has been with Tualatin Valley Water District for twenty years and has been an active AWWA member for fifteen years. This includes efforts at the local, regional, and national levels.






### Young Professionals

Thank you and I look forward to seeing all of you at the Annual Conference in January.



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


### FIRE HYDRANT WATER PRESSURE RELIEF VALVES

The NORMAN NOE CO INC offers water pressure relief valves that are used to help relieve water main pressure when a water tank is "off line" for maintenance or emergencies. The adjustable valves are preset to 65 psi and come complete with 2-1/2 inch fire hydrant and fire hose discharge adapters and a 0-100 psi pressure gauge.

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### Chad Pregracke, Keynote Speaker at Annual Conference

Chad is the internationally named 2013 CNN Hero of the Year, founder and president of Living Lands & Waters; a nonprofit river cleanup organization, author and professional public speaker. He is proof one person can make a difference.

Best known for starting out as a young man in East Moline, Illinois wanting a cleaner waterway, Chad has become the champion for the Mississippi River. Growing up on its banks, he worked as a commercial shell diver during his early years, experiencing the river from the bottom up. Sometimes spending 10 hours a day in the depths and current of the pitch black waters, he crawled nearly 150 miles of the river bottom over six years. Chad saw its beauty and



was frustrated by the neglect. At the age of 17, he decided to clean it up. Twenty two years later, Chad and his Living Lands & Waters crew have organized and led over 800 cleanups on 23 rivers in 20 states and removed an estimated eight million pounds of garbage. Chad had an idea that evolved into a movement that has helped to restore one of America's greatest icons, the Mississippi River.

Chad has been recognized by former President, George W. Bush as a national "Point of Light." He received a standing ovation at the Kennedy Center from all four living former U.S. Presidents for his inspirational message on dreaming big, taking action, persevering, leading and collaborating. He has been the keynote speaker for college graduations, business conferences and events, classrooms, nonprofit organizations and more. Named "America's Hardest Working Person" by Mitchum, Chad's enthusiasm, sense of humor and passion amplifies his story and entertains audiences. Ultimately, his message inspires people to believe they can make a difference.

Chad currently lives and works with his wife Tammy dividing their time between life on the Teamwork barge and their home in East Moline, IL.

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
